Our heartbeat is that every person coming through the doors at Nexus Care experiences acceptance, dignity and generous practical support through the kindness and compassion of our people and programs. This is why I am so passionate about Nexus Care's work.

When Nexus Care began in 2011, the need was right on our doorstep and there was little to no support services in our North-Brisbane corridor; nearby large suburbs such as Stafford, Chermside and Keperra reported increased poverty levels yet a distinct lack of any essential support services nearby. Nexus Church pioneered a charity to stand in that gap and Nexus Care's Fresh Start Food Program (FSFP) was launched.

Now in 2020, we celebrate many more successful support programs occurring weekly with a modest

estimation of feeding over 12,000 people since we opened.

A hallmark of Nexus Care is our continued adaptability to genuinely meet hardship with hope. This came to the fore once again as the impacts of COVID-19 started to be felt by many early this year.

I am so proud that as an essential service, we not only remained open supplying excellent food relief but lifted in our support and reach to the community throughout this time.

All of this was possible because of the generosity of donors, the dedicated team of staff, volunteers and suppliers and the support of many Nexus Church congregation members that join us in our mission.

As you read this Annual Report, I trust you'll see that our heart is far more than just providing high-quality support programs. For us, it's also about seeing each individual with eyes of compassion and gently lifting their head to help them see that they too can find a fresh start.

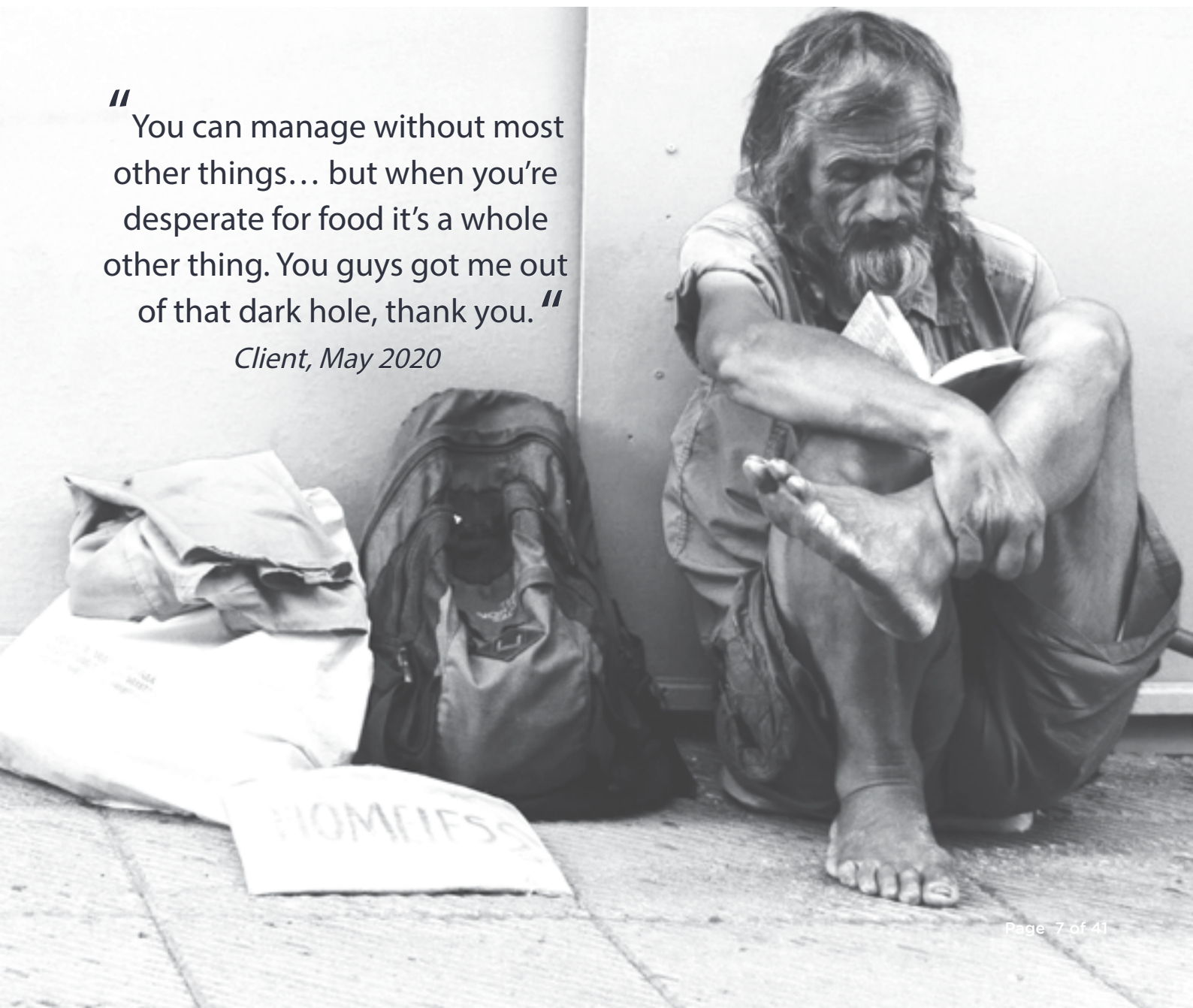

GROWTH OVER THE YEARS

2010

A six month strategic review of community need was conducted forming the basis from which Nexus Care programs would be developed.

2011

Nexus Care was launched just in time to provide a massive flood relief effort for people affected by the 2011 Brisbane flood disaster. Nexus Care's innovative flagship program, the Fresh Start Food Program, was launched helping 40 households a month with nutritious food parcels and educational resources, along with monthly cooking classes began in November. Five school breakfast programs were run weekly. Set up of the COACH Program began with 14 mentors trained. Nexus Care hosted our first Christmas celebration with 30 people.

2012

The Fresh Start Food Program entered its second year, running four school breakfast programs, supporting 55 families a month with healthy food parcels and offering monthly cooking classes. Nexus Care received additional support from two interns and began hosting TAFE and university students. New resources were developed and essential equipment was obtained along with new

partnerships developed, increasing our access to in-kind food donations. Nexus Care completed a large flood recovery project funded by RACQ, involving renovations, food parcels, and rural clean up trips.

2013

Nexus Care employed a full time Program Manager and were able to increase staffing for Fresh Start and COACH programs to meet increasing demand. Our volunteer support base also increased, with volunteers investing more than over 100 hours of time per week. Fresh Start grew from supporting 65 families monthly in January to 113 in December. Cooking classes increased to twice monthly and school breakfasts continued in five schools. The COACH program began to expand significantly with 12 families supported that year and additional mentors trained. Nexus Care's COACH Coordinator became accredited to deliver mentor training. Nexus Care also launched our Community Connect program to combat social isolation, holding monthly community morning teas and school holiday programs for children identified as at risk. Nexus Care was contracted by the Multicultural Community Association to deliver food parcels and toiletries to newly arrived asylum seekers. A large Christmas

celebration was held with 110 people in attendance. Nexus Care also hosted our very first community fun run - the Fresh Startathon!

2014

At the start of 2014, Nexus Care was supporting up to 120 families monthly with the waiting list removed. We entered into a partnership with Oz Harvest to deliver the NEST cooking program. Strategic evaluations of both the Fresh Start and COACH programs were conducted with the support of QUT nutrition and public health students. Nexus Care received funding to undertake a COACH pilot study for refugee families. Through COACH we have been able to support 40 families and see amazing lifelong transformation! Nexus Care's Community Connect programs continued to expand, hosting personal development programs and family fun days along with morning teas, school holiday programs and Christmas events.

2015

Nexus Care commenced new key programs including an ER (Emergency Relief) Program partnering with the Department of Social Services, the FOODcents cooking course and the Christians Against

Poverty (CAP) Money Course. We launched our 6th Breakfast Program at Lawnton State School in partnership with David Deane Real Estate at Strathpine. Strategic evaluation of our School Breakfast and COACH Programs were conducted with the support of QUT nutrition and human services students. A further 14 families were supported through our COACH program and empowered to achieve life goals. Our Community Connect Programs continued to facilitate social inclusion with school holiday programs, morning teas, Christmas events and personal development programs.

2016

Nexus Care launched our Youth COACH pilot which saw 11 coaches trained and 13 young people matched into COACH relationships. Throughout all COACH programs 40 coaches were trained and 29 families and young people entered COACH relationships. We supported 182 families each month with fresh, nutritious food parcels, a 31% increase in 2015. Our Community Connect Programs continued to develop including school holiday programs, CAP money course, a SHINE group with mums at Somerset Hills State School, morning teas, Christmas events and more. In addition, 244 people in financial crisis received financial relief and support through our ER Program.

2017

Nexus Care has seen growth in our Fresh Start Food Program supporting 247 families with healthy nutritious

food parcels each month, an increase of 28.58% in 2016. In addition, 268 people in financial crisis received financial relief and support through our ER Program. Our Community Connect Programs continued to develop with CAP Money course, morning teas, a school holiday program, Christmas events and more. Our volunteer supporter base continues to provide over 120 hours support per week and we also commenced an agreement with Crossway Life Care as State COACH Relationships Manager supporting the growth of COACH across Queensland. Our volunteer supporter base continues to provide over 140 hours support per week.

2018

Nexus Care has seen growth in our Fresh Start Food Program supporting 263 families with healthy nutritious food parcels each month, an increase of 13.56% in 2017. In addition, 272 people in financial crisis received financial relief and support through our ER Program. Along with our ongoing Community Connect Programs including morning tea, Christmas events we also piloted new initiatives including a kids cooking class, and school based dance class along with more. Our volunteer supporter base continues to provide over 90 hours support per week and we also were successful in our tender to continue to provide Emergency Financial Relief in partnership with the Department of Social Services into 2019.

2019

In February Nexus Care supported it's 4000th family in the Fresh Start Food Program and throughout the year supported on average 323 families each month, an increase of 23% on 2018. We have enjoyed growing partnerships with organisations like Share the Dignity, The Nest Community, Local State Schools and more. New initiatives like community thank you morning teas, and a Stafford State School community dance class began. Our volunteer supporter base continues to provide over 90 hours support per week. We also launched our inaugural charity golf day with 58 participants and saw a record number of people supported over the Christmas season.

2020

In the first 6 months of 2020 we all felt the impact of COVID-19 and Nexus Care once again rose to the occasion with extra-care beyond our normal. We got to work phoning those we knew were in the vulnerable categories offering extra support including deliveries for a time, we adapted our Emergency financial relief assistance to take phone bookings, and as we noticed a change in the cohort of people connecting with us we tailored our support further. Through all of this new partnerships were formed. Additionally, we were grateful to receive extra financial provisions from the Department of Social Services for Emergency Relief programs.

THE YEAR AT A GLANCE

In the last twelve months Nexus Care has recorded steady growth in all our key programs and services.

2019

July

We began the year with a significant increase in demand. We saw 265 families supported with healthy food parcels, that being 30.54% more than July 2018. Additionally, 28 people were assisted through our Financial Emergency Relief program, up on 15 people July 2018. Brekky Clubs at all five schools kicked into third term with purpose and enthusiasm.

August

While our core programs continued on strong supporting over 300 households we were also excited to see our Inaugural Charity Golf Day go off so well. It was held on the 23rd August and was a huge success. Thanks to the 58 players, five business & the team of 10 staff/volunteers that helped to raise awareness and funds for the work of Nexus Care.

Sept

Community dance classes continued with great engagement by students at both Somerset Hills State School and Stafford Heights State School. We saw an increase of 30.87% this month with 301 people supported

with healthy food parcels, additionally 26 people were assisted with financial emergency relief.

Oct

In addition to our regular activities and programs we hosted a morning tea for all the staff at Stafford State School to encourage and honour them for the work they are doing in our community. Additionally, building on our key partnerships Suki (Community Programs Coordinator) visited OzHarvest and spoke to their 'Cooking For A Cause' team about Brekky Clubs and the significant impact they have. We were grateful to receive a grant from The Feed Appeal for two new fridges to increase our storage capacity and provide more food to the community.

Nov

We were privileged to have Children from Next Steps Kindy's greenthumbs team visit the office with a wonderfully decorated donation envelope. They had been busy growing plants & selling them to family and friends. Also, Suki, Josh and Steven attended OzHarvests 8th Birthday celebration

and received a beautiful birthday cake to pass onto one of our wonderful Nexus Care friends. The recipient was a single mum who was new to Nexus Care and was having a 'bad day'. As expected, demand for our programs began to ramp up heading into the Christmas season.

Dec

December is one of our biggest months. Nexus Care distributed 552 healthy food parcels and 541 Christmas Hampers in the lead up to Christmas (20.22% more than 2018). We loved having a team from NAB attend a hamper packing party. We were also delighted to partner with Prison Fellowship's Angel Tree Program, providing gifts to 16 local children with a parent in prison. We so enjoyed joining thousands of locals at Nexus Community Carols Festival in Everton Park, the Nexus Care team donned festive-wear and sold gingerbreads and cakes for our annual Christmas Appeal. Throughout the month, support from our local community helped us to exceed our goal of raising 20k and see more than 150 people give.

2020

January

Nexus Care was quickly back in business in January, supporting families with fresh food during the post Christmas and back to school period. As part of the funds raised through our 2019 Christmas Appeal we were able to provide support to families (over 25 children) struggling with back to school costs through Somerset State School, Stafford Heights State School, Everton Park State School, and Everton Park High School.

February

We turned nine years old! School term started and Nexus Care launched its 2020 Breakfast Programs in Craigslea High, Everton Park High, Somerset Hills State School, Everton Park State School, and Stafford Heights State School. Community dance classes at Somerset Hills State School and Stafford State School also began. To launch the year off with our wonderful volunteers we hosted a special lunch in their honour, thanking them for their ongoing practical support of Nexus Care and speaking to the year ahead. We also reached the milestone of assisting 5,000 households in our community through our Fresh Start Food Program.

March

March saw the beginning impact of the COVID-19 pandemic which contributed to this being our biggest month ever outside of Christmas with 384 families supported with food

relief. As part of our response we launched phone appointments for our Financial Emergency Relief program and started to call all our vulnerable clients over 70 years old to offer help, special deliveries, and assistance in navigating supports available. Our food supply chains became unreliable but our team worked hard to find alternate ways to secure the food we needed and in doing so kept our food relief program strong throughout. Additionally, while we needed to ask all our volunteers to not come in for a time, our key partnership with Nexus Church saw them arrange for their staff to fill the gaps in manpower up until the end of June.

April

While Brekky Clubs were on hold indefinitely Nexus Care hosted five morning teas at Brekky Club schools to recognise, honour, and encourage the staff of each school as they navigated the impacts of COVID-19, especially with online learning for their students. In addition to our normal activities 28 home deliveries of food parcels were made to those more vulnerable to COVID-19. In partnership with Share the Dignity we were able to distribute hygiene products to women struggling to afford them otherwise.

May

We supported 35 people with financial emergency relief and saw a significant increase in the number of international

people coming to Nexus Care with 114 (of 293) people being born overseas. Within this, 52 were Spanish speaking and 13 Mongolian speaking so to help increase the accessibility of our services, key information and literature was translated into Spanish and Mongolian. Additionally, we were grateful to receive an in-kind donation of food from the Enoggera Army Barracks. During National Volunteer week, we shared on social media the stories of five wonderful Nexus Care volunteers.

June

In June, we were able to assist 340 families with healthy food parcels, 25 people with financial emergency Relief. Additionally, Somerset Hills State School and Everton Park High School Brekky Club's were able to start up again and our EOFY Appeal was a success thanks to the generosity expressed by many. As an essential service and because of our committed donors and supporters, we not only stayed open during the COVID-19 lockdown but adapted quickly to be able to help people all over Brisbane who had been impacted by the pandemic the most.

At Nexus Care we quickly saw an immediate rise in panic for families needing food and the vulnerable losing access to the basics. Our school Brekky Clubs were halted, we needed to ask the majority of our volunteers to stay home and our staff worked overtime to navigate maintaining quality food parcels.

Extra government funding came through in April and with that, a very different cohort of people came through our doors. Many of these international families and individuals were denied access to government support (as they are a non-Australian resident) and so this meant they were among the first in our society to lose work which resulted in an immediate need for basics like food.

Our FSFP (Fresh Start Food Program) pivoted to get fresh food to those in the gap. Refugees, people on bridging visas and international students could now access more food to feed their

families. Our Emergency Financial Assistance program adapted to best utilise government funding and quickly get it into the hands of eligible families who were hit with unemployment, illness or job loss.

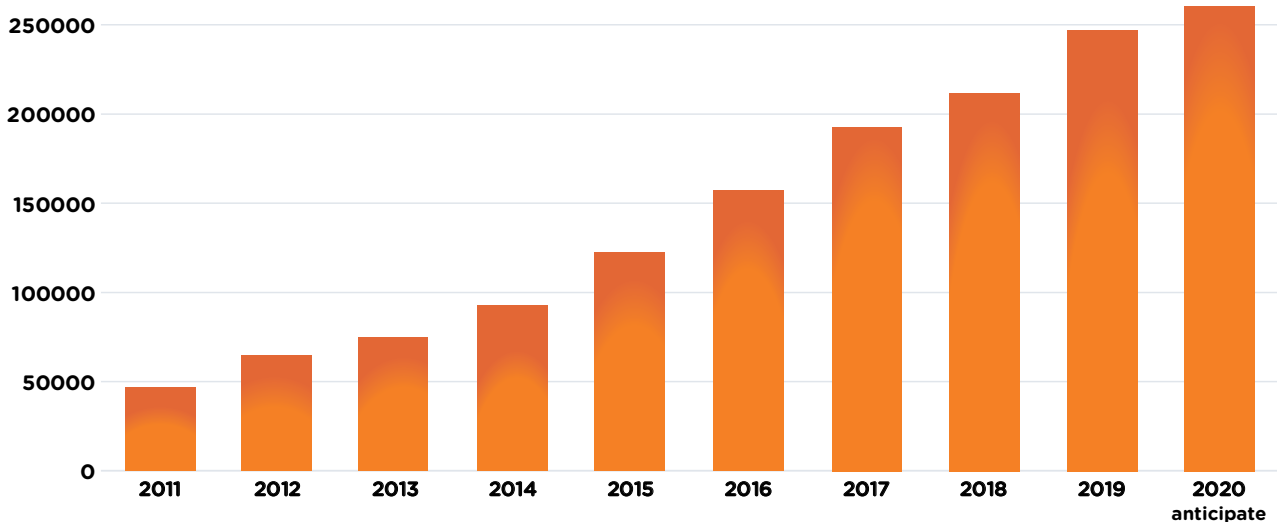
FOOD PARCELS & EDUCATION | SCHOOL BREKKY CLUBS

Food is not only fundamental to our wellbeing, but plays a key role in how we connect and belong in our community. Where there is not enough to eat, the impact can affect many areas of a person's life.

The Fresh Start Food Program (FSFP) was created by a qualified nutritionist and is the flagship program of Nexus Care. The program offers immediate food relief to those experiencing

hardship, provides education to empower people with knowledge and skills to support their family, and coordinates various local school breakfast programs.

Over the past 12 months, Nexus Care has handed out food parcels to teenagers as young as 17, older Aussies up to 90 years and everyone in between. Our team works hard to not only offer nutritious food parcels but seek to lovingly care for each person that comes through the door.

Including school breakfast services, the FSFP has grown from providing the equivalent of 42,000 meals each year to now, in 2020, an anticipated 260,000 meals, should current trends continue. Over the years, the quality

and size of our food parcels have continued to grow along with advocacy and referral support provided to those engaging with the program.

This would not have been possible without the amazing in-kind donations (see page 26) as well as our generous financial donors which allow us to purchase the necessary food items to ensure the parcels are well rounded and nutritious.

Over **14,280** breakfast meals were provided in 2019-2020. Our Brekky Club teams are committed to five local schools and volunteer a collect 25.5 hours each week towards serving a nutritious breakfast and fostering a sense of belonging amongst students.

EMERGENCY FINANCIAL RELIEF

SUPPORTING PEOPLE IN CRISIS

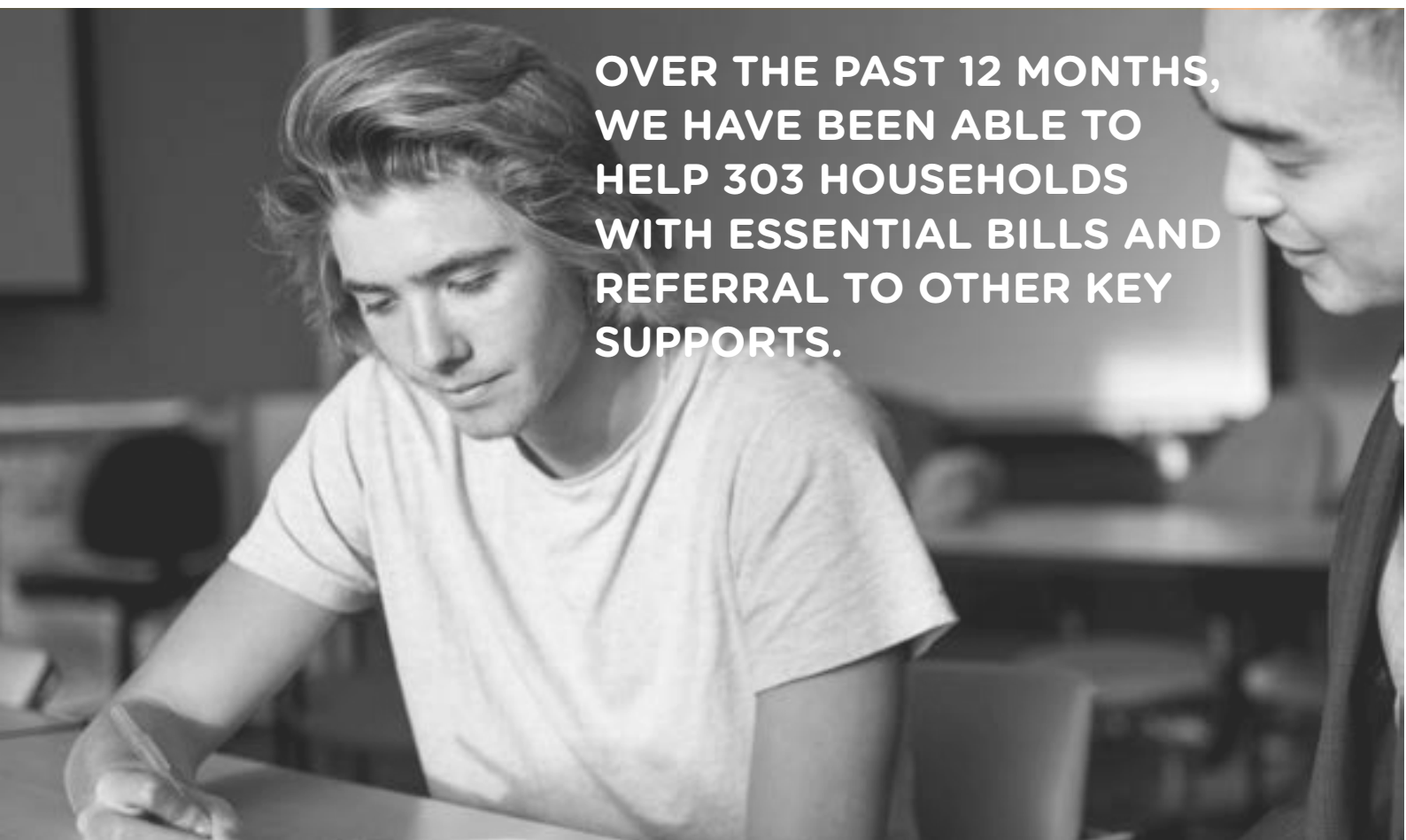
We know financial emergency relief is not a solution on its own, but is so often vital in helping a person to lift their head out of the survival mode of that day and consider more clearly their options for change going forward. Started in 2015, this program compliments our FSNP and is part of the broader wrap around support we provide.

Financial contributions are given to eligible people to financially aid support with bills and vouchers for those presenting in crisis, along with vital budgeting and referral support across Brisbane North & West SA4 catchments.

Partnering with the Department of Social Services (DSS), Nexus Care was able to continue providing

this emergency relief to people in 2018-19. In the last year, 303 households were helped with over \$55,000 in combined support.

DSS funding contributes to both our Food and Financial ER programs and has helped over 1,200 households this financial year. We are grateful for this partnership.

We could not deliver the high-quality programs and services without the generous support of donors.

In December 2019 we were grateful for the generosity of so many to our annual Christmas Appeal raising a little over \$40,000 towards all our Christmas

In June 2020 our major EOFY appeal kicked off with an added intention to raise awareness of the increasing demand on our programs and services especially as a result of COVID-19 impacts. Thanks to loyal and local donors, we reached our goal and more than \$202,000

was raised. All of which is vital in funding the delivery of all we do. We also want to thank The Feed Appeal for their grant of \$6517 to purchase two new fridges that increased our ability to storage capacity getting more food in and through to our local community
